Today, we celebrate Independence Day—America's birthday—the Fourth of July. For many Americans, the day is filled with gatherings of family and friends, cookouts, an assortment of firework displays and a well-deserved day off. The importance of the holiday is not in the celebrations we hold but in recognizing the significance of our nation's founding and ideals.

The 13 colonies were already engaged in open conflict with England for well over a year when, in the summer of 1776, the Continental Congress was convened in Philadelphia. Our Founding Fathers were military leaders, rebels and politicians who varied in their personalities, social statuses and backgrounds. Still, they came together to forge a framework for a young democracy through the Declaration of Independence.

America's origin is often portrayed as a smooth transition from independent colonies to the United States. However, that was not the case. Our Founding Fathers were uncertain about managing our budding nation and openly questioned one another's leadership. The debates were more divisive than we care to recollect, and many at the time thought the American experiment would fail.

But due to the unyielding spirit of the first American patriots, they overcame their differences and a powerful call for freedom was answered. Thanks to the courage of the troops who served in Washington's army, willing to die for their freedom and that of their families and neighbors, we can now celebrate their sacrifices on this day.

That sense of duty, honor and country became engrained in the mindset of American patriots throughout the generations. It was on display on the battlefields and in the trenches of Europe in World War I, on the islands of the Pacific in World War II, the hills of Korea, the jungles of Vietnam, the mountains of Afghanistan, the deserts of Iraq and Syria and throughout all conflicts, operations and military service to our nation.
